Jefferson Community Collaborative 2020 Census Overview

Why is the Census Important for the Jefferson Area?

The Constitution requires a count of everyone living in the United States, regardless of age, immigration status, language spoken, etc. The goal is to count everyone once, only once, and in the right place. However, conducting an accurate count has proved challenging: the 2010 Census missed an estimated 1.5 million people nationwide, including 21% of people in Allegheny County – enumerators had to complete extra follow up with these individuals to ensure they were counted.

The Jefferson Area constitutes nearly 20% of Allegheny County's population, so our area is impactful. Historically, some communities have been more likely to be missed in the count:

- Children (specifically ages 0-5)
- Immigrants
- People of Color
- Rural Households
- Low-Income Households
- Students at Local Colleges & Universities

Changes to the 2020 Census Increase Difficulty for an Accurate Count in the Jefferson Area

- **Digital Divide:** The Census Questionnaire will be moving online for the first time, which could pose issues for older adults.
 - 19% of Jefferson Area Adult Population is over 65
- Decreased Funding: Less resources available to fund outreach efforts
- **Potential Citizenship Question:** Not included in a Census questionnaire since 1950, some believe this could suppress the 2020 count, particularly among immigrant communities.
 - o 40% of Allegheny County's refugee population reside in the Jefferson area

Allegheny County & the City of Pittsburgh have created a Complete Count Committee (CCC), comprised of a broad spectrum of government and community leaders to:

- Represent trusted voices from a variety of sectors (including philanthropy, education, business, healthcare, human services, etc.)
- Create and implement awareness and activation campaigns to encourage Census participation

Next Steps for Jefferson Community Collaborative

- Andrea Stanford (Allegheny County Staff to the Complete Count Committee) to speak about Census at January 23rd Collaborative Meeting
- JRF Foundation Grants Committee is willing to provide support for the Vision Council and Collaborative to develop a local plan for Census 2020 Count
- Jefferson Area Census Leadership Team meeting in February 2019 to begin developing local outreach plan
- Once Jefferson Area Census Plan is defined, Collaborative's Community Engagement Team will help provide implementation guidance
