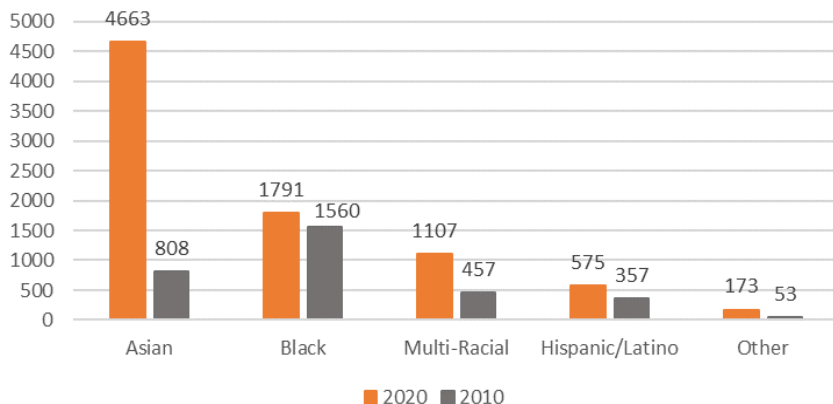


People

Population: 38,559

- The Baldwin-Whitehall School District (BWS D) total population increased by 8% from 35,646 in 2010.¹
- The BWS D population represents about 18% of the total Jefferson area population and comprises the Baldwin Township, Baldwin Borough, and Whitehall municipalities.
- Similar to the region, the BWS D is experiencing changing racial demographics. The White population decreased by 2,211 (7%) while all other races saw growth.¹
- The Asian population grew by 477% from 2010 to 2020, reflecting growth in the Bhutanese and Nepalese communities. The Multi-Racial population also grew by 142%, reflecting trends across the Jefferson area.¹
- 20% of the total population is over age 65— higher than both Allegheny County (19%) and the City of Pittsburgh (15%). Age 18—64 makes up 60% of the BWS D Communities and under 18 accounts for 20%. Median age for BWS D Communities is 43, compared to 44 in all JRF Communities, 41 in the County, and 33 in the City of Pittsburgh.¹

Community

PA 211 Data shows that requests for housing & shelter assistance peaked in December 2020 (55 requests), January 2021 (74) and February 2022 (55) with roughly 13% of requests submitted during those months alone.

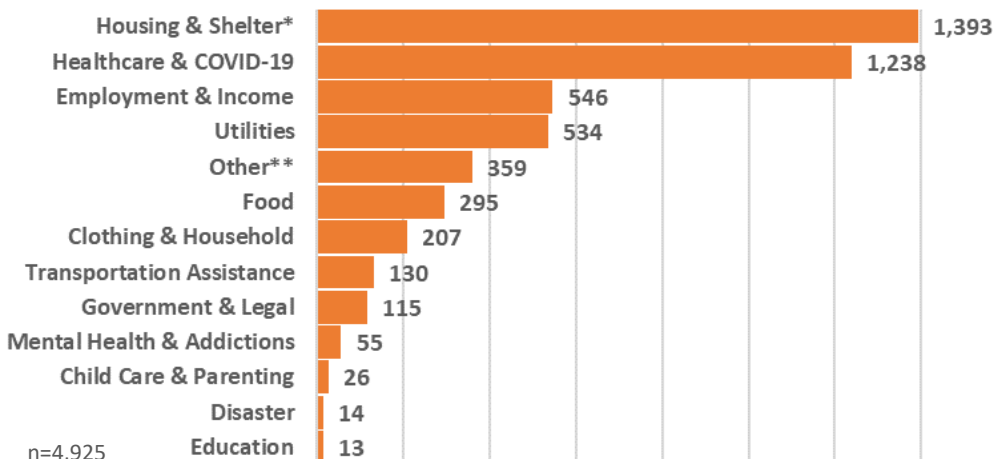
From February-April 2021, residents submitted 752 requests related to Healthcare & COVID-19 assistance, accounting for 61% of such requests. 28% (341) requests related to COVID-19 vaccination.
