Evaluation Summary

For the first time in three years, the Jefferson Regional Foundation hosted its annual Forum in person at the Crowne Plaza South on Thursday, May 5. The 8th Annual Jefferson Forum centered around the theme of Navigating the Unknown and how we have adapted to shifting demands, creating new ways of operating in our professional and personal lives. We challenged attendees to consider where possibilities and opportunities exist, embracing these changes that frame our daily lives with unity and ingenuity.

100% of attendees agreed the Forum was **productive** to attend (85% strongly agreed)
