

Increasing Diversity in the BBSD Growth in Selected Racial & Ethnic Demographic Populations 2010 to 2020

The population of people who identify as White was 9,064 in 2010 and 8,026 in 2020 for a decrease of 11.5%. The White population is not included in the chart below to maintain readability.



*Due to small sample size, we have included individuals identifying as Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, American Indian, or as an identity not listed in the survey ("Other") in People Identifying as Any Other Single Race Alone. Note that racial categories are non-Hispanic.

- The Brentwood Borough School District (BBSD) total population increased by 5% from 9,643 in 2010.1
- The BBSD population represents about 5% of the total Jefferson area population and serves the Borough of Brentwood.
- Similar to the Jefferson region as a whole, the school district is experiencing changing racial demographics. BBSD is becoming more diverse. The White Alone population decreased by 11.5% from 9,064 in 2010 to 8,026 in 2020, while all other races saw growth.1
- The Asian Alone population grew by 832% and the Multiracial population grew by 217% in the BBSD Communities between 2010 and 2020, reflecting trends in the Jefferson area.¹
- The median age for the BBSD community is 36, younger than Allegheny County (41) and older than the City of Pittsburgh (33). Of the total population, 22% are under 18 years, 62% are ages 18-64, and 16% are 65 or and older.

- 11% of population age 16 and over take public transportation to work.
- 63% of workers drive alone with avg. commute time of 30 min.

Median Household **Income**

- On average, 20% of **BBSD** families have income below 200% of the federal poverty level (FPL).
- 80% of families under 100% of the FPL are single mother families.

College Education

All JRF: 30% Allegheny County: 43% City of Pittsburgh: 45%

- 29% of population 25 years old and over has completed a Bachelor's Degree or higher.
- This about the same as the 2015 estimates (28%).

Graduation Rate⁷

All JRF: 92% City of Pittsburgh: 82%

- As of 2020, BBSD had 1,215 number of total students enrolled with 223 receiving special education services.
- BBSD has 4 public schools.

Owner-Occupied

Allegheny County: 64%

- 65% of occupied housing units are owner occupied and 35% are renter occupied.
- 93% of housing units are occupied.

3,467 Individuals receiving income supports from DHS³

Services may include Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), Medicaid or receive health insurance through HealthChoices. Data is from 1/1/2022 through 8/1/2022.

495 Individuals received transportation assistance through ACCESS⁶

ACCESS is a door-to-door, advance reservation, shared-ride transportation program provided throughout Allegheny County. Data is from 7/1/2021 through 6/30/2021.

574 Households received utility assistance from LIHEAP4

The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) helps families living on low incomes pay their heating bills. Data is from 10/18/2021 through 6/17/2022.

166 Homelessness & housing services have been provided by the DHS³

Services are provided by DHS and DHS-contracted providers and include housing assistance, case management, prevention and outreach for individuals and families receiving prevention services, support services and/or housing who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. Data is from 1/1/2022 through 8/1/2022.

10 Individuals receiving Partner 4 Work services⁵

Title I (WIOA & WIOA Dislocated Workers) includes services that focus on finding jobs and providing more in-depth services such as training programs for adults and dislocated workers. Participants are assigned a case manager and work with that manager to secure an employment position. Data is from 7/1/2021 through 6/30/2021.
