

# Community

Population: 12,982

- The Elizabeth Township total population decreased by 2% from 13,271 in 2010.<sup>1</sup>
- The Elizabeth Township population represents about 6% of the ۰ total Jefferson area population.
- Similar to the Jefferson region as a whole, the township is experiencing changing racial demographics. The White Alone population decreased by about 6% from 12,823 in 2010 to 12,030 in 2020, but still remains the area's largest racial group, comprising about 93% of residents.<sup>1</sup>
- The Multiracial population grew by 313% and the Hispanic • population grew by 89% between 2010 and 2020, reflecting trends in the Jefferson area.<sup>1</sup>
- The median age in Elizabeth Township is 49, older than Allegheny County (41) and the City of Pittsburgh (33). Of the total population, 17% are under 18 years, 60% are ages 18-64, and 23% are 65 or and older.

Title I (WIOA & WIOA Dislocated Workers) includes services that focus on finding jobs and providing more in-depth services such as training programs for adults and dislocated workers. Participants are assigned a case manager and work with that manager to secure an employment position. Data is from 7/1/2021 through 6/30/2021.
