

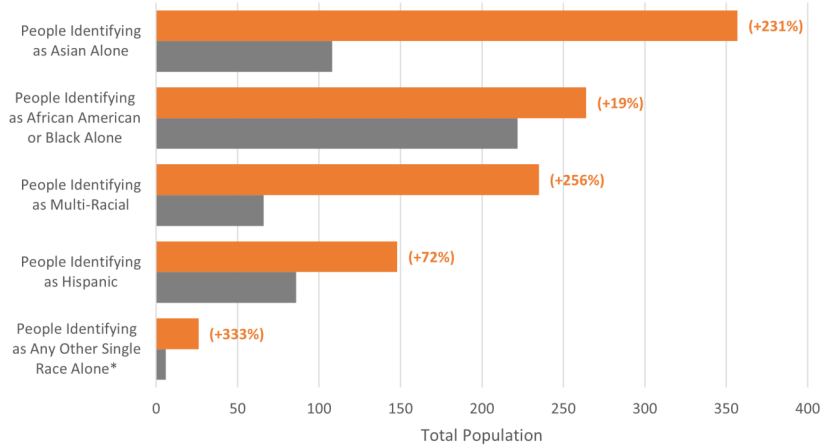
## Community

Population: 8,504

- The Pleasant Hills Borough **total population increased by 3%** from 8,276 in 2010.<sup>1</sup>
- The Pleasant Hills Borough population **represents about 4% of the total Jefferson area population.**
- Similar to the Jefferson region as a whole, the **borough is experiencing changing racial demographics.** The White Alone population decreased by about 4% from 7,789 in 2010 to 7,474 in 2020, but still remains the area's largest racial group, comprising about 88% of residents.<sup>1</sup>
- **The population identifying as Any Other Single Race Alone\* and the Multiracial population grew by 333% and 256%,** respectively, between 2010 and 2020, reflecting trends in the Jefferson area.<sup>1</sup>
- The **median age in Pleasant Hills Borough is 48**, older than Allegheny County (41) and the City of Pittsburgh (33). Of the total population, 19% are under 18 years, 57% are ages 18-64, and 24% are 65 or and older.

### Increasing Diversity in Pleasant Hills Borough Growth in Selected Racial & Ethnic Demographic Populations 2010 to 2020

The population of people who identify as White was 7,789 in 2010 and 7,474 in 2020 for a decrease of 4%. The White population is not included in the chart below to maintain readability.



\*Due to small sample size, we have included individuals identifying as Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, American Indian, or as an identity not listed in the survey ("Other") in *People Identifying as Any Other Single Race Alone*. Note that racial categories are non-Hispanic.

### Services Provided in Pleasant Hills

#### 1,552 Individuals receiving income supports from DHS<sup>3</sup>

Services may include Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), Medicaid or receive health insurance through HealthChoices. Data is from 2022.

#### 623 Households received utility assistance from LIHEAP<sup>4</sup>

The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) helps families living on low incomes pay their heating bills. Data is from 10/18/2021 through 6/17/2022.

#### 454 Individuals received transportation assistance through ACCESS<sup>5</sup>

ACCESS is a door-to-door, advance reservation, shared-ride transportation program provided throughout Allegheny County. Data is from 7/1/2021 through 6/30/2021.

#### 26 Homelessness & housing services have been provided by the DHS<sup>3</sup>

Services are provided by DHS and DHS-contracted providers and include housing assistance, case management, prevention and outreach for individuals and families receiving prevention services, support services and/or housing who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. Data is from 2022.

#### 7 Individuals receiving Partner 4 Work services<sup>5</sup>

Title I (WIOA & WIOA Dislocated Workers) includes services that focus on finding jobs and providing more in-depth services such as training programs for adults and dislocated workers. Participants are assigned a case manager and work with that manager to secure an employment position. Data is from 7/1/2021 through 6/30/2021.



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
