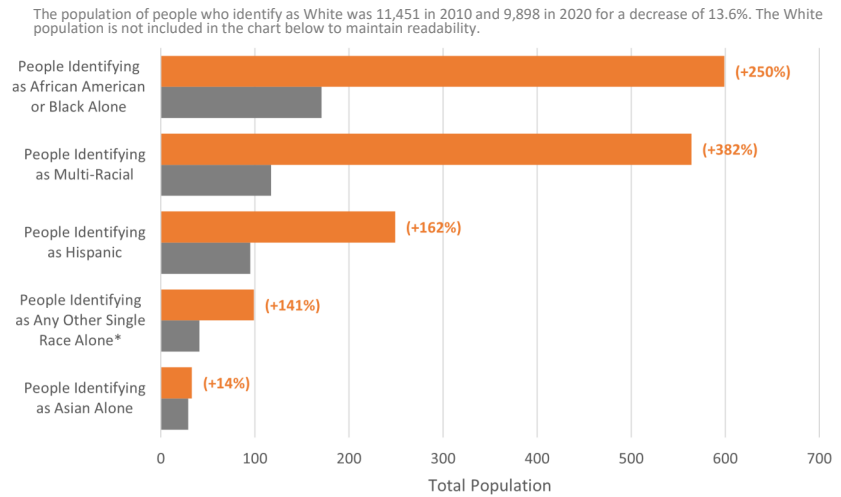


Community

Population: 11,442

- The South Allegheny School District (SASD) total population decreased by 4% from 11,904 in 2010.¹
- The SASD population represents about 5% of the total Jefferson area population and comprises the Glassport, Liberty, Lincoln, and Port Vue municipalities.
- Similar to the Jefferson region as a whole, the school district is experiencing changing racial demographics. SASD is becoming more diverse. The White Alone population decreased by 14% from 11,451 in 2010 to 9,898 in 2020, while all other races saw growth.¹
- The Multiracial and Black Alone populations in the SASD Communities grew by 382% and 250%, respectively, between 2010 and 2020, reflecting trends in the Jefferson area.¹
- The median age for the SASD community is 45, older than Allegheny County (41) and the City of Pittsburgh (33). Of the total population, 18% are under 18 years, 63% are ages 18-64, and 19% are 65 or and older.

4,198 Individuals receiving income supports from DHS³

Services may include Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), Medicaid or receive health insurance through HealthChoices. Data is from 1/1/2022 through 8/1/2022.

2,242 Households received utility assistance from LIHEAP⁴

The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) helps families living on low incomes pay their heating bills. Data is from 10/18/2021 through 6/17/2022.

1,978 Individuals received transportation assistance through ACCESS⁶

ACCESS is a door-to-door, advance reservation, shared-ride transportation program provided throughout Allegheny County. Data is from 7/1/2021 through 6/30/2021.

222 Homelessness & housing services have been provided by the DHS³

Services are provided by DHS and DHS-contracted providers and include housing assistance, case management, prevention and outreach for individuals and families receiving prevention services, support services and/or housing who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. Data is from 1/1/2022 through 8/1/2022.

9 Individuals receiving Partner 4 Work services⁵

Title I (WIOA & WIOA Dislocated Workers) includes services that focus on finding jobs and providing more in-depth services such as training programs for adults and dislocated workers. Participants are assigned a case manager and work with that manager to secure an employment position. Data is from 7/1/2021 through 6/30/2021.
