
West Mifflin Area School District **Community Snapshot Issued May 2023**

Community

Population: 20,768

- The West Mifflin Area School District (WMASD) total population decreased by 4% from 21,768 in 2010.¹
- The WMASD population represents about 10% of the total ۰ Jefferson area population and serves the Boroughs of West Mifflin and Whitaker.
- Similar to the Jefferson region as a whole, the school district is experiencing changing racial demographics. The White Alone population decreased by 11% from 18,497 in 2010 to 16,413 in 2020, while all other races saw growth.¹
- The Multiracial population and those identifying as Any • Other Single Race Alone* grew by 169% and 157%, respectively, between 2010 and 2020, reflecting trends in the Jefferson area.¹
- The median age for the WMSD community is 45, older than • Allegheny County (41) and the City of Pittsburgh (33). Of the total population, 22% are under 18 years, 59% are ages 18-64, and 19% are 65 or and older.

7,286 Individuals receiving income supports from DHS³

Services may include Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), Medicaid or receive health insurance through HealthChoices. Data is from 1/1/2022 through 8/1/2022.

2,324 Households received utility assistance from LIHEAP⁴

The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) helps families living on low incomes pay their heating bills. Data is from 10/18/2021 through 6/17/2022.

Title I (WIOA & WIOA Dislocated Workers) includes services that focus on finding jobs and providing more in-depth services such as training programs for adults and dislocated workers. Participants are assigned a case manager and work with that manager to secure an employment position. Data is from 7/1/2021 through 6/30/2021.
